

## **Graduation Rates**

Your contributions enabled us to invest nearly \$70,000 in boosting school success through summer programs, tutoring, real-world learning, and preparatory programs for college and career.

- Kindergarten Academy In August, 78 incoming kindergartners from eight elementary schools participated in this pilot program. Emphasizing social and emotional learning, Kindergarten Academy was geared primarily toward emerging bilingual students and those with limited preschool experience.
- **High School Credit Recovery** Summer programs gave students a critical opportunity to get "back on track" for graduation, contributing to the district's steady increase in graduation rates from 67 percent to 85 percent over the past five years.
- AVID Students in this elective program were prepared for success in high school, college, and future careers.
- Woodshop Palooza The high schools hosted this week-long woodshop program geared toward 6th grade girls.

**Educational Access** 

Your contributions enabled us to invest \$70,000 in promoting wellness and reducing barriers to education for students maneuvering difficult circumstances.

- Grants and contributions allowed our secondary schools to launch **Sources of Strength**, a youth suicide prevention project designed to harness the power of peer social networks to change unhealthy norms and culture.
- Our Student Opportunity for Success (SOS) fund provided a safety net for 2200 students on free and reduced lunch. Support included food, clothing, after-school care, hygiene supplies, eyeglasses, school supplies, and help with fees.
- An estimated 210 students were homeless in our schools last year. Your donations provided assistance for students living in tents, cars, shelters, or other temporary arrangements while attending school.
