## Celebrating 20 Years of Supporting Public Education

This year the Corvallis Public Schools Foundation marked its 20th anniversary with a benefit breakfast event called "Hands Across Corvallis." Nearly 200 people, including founding members of the organization, gathered to commemorate this milestone, raising over \$30,000. Join us on February 3rd, 2017 for the next "Hands Across Corvallis" breakfast!

As we begin our next chapter in support of kids and schools, we continue to:

- Reduce barriers to education for students navigating poverty and homelessness.
- Create pathways to graduation for all students, and
- Expand excellence through enrichment opportunities.



## REDUCING BARRIERS

The Corvallis community has changed dramatically in the past decade. Our schools are now more culturally diverse with regard to language, race/ethnicity, and social class than at any previous time. It is a goal of the Foundation to be responsive to these changes in ways that assure a high quality education for all students.

Students from low socio-economic circumstances face a wide range of difficulties that can curtail educational attainment and future success. Thirty-six percent of our students qualify for free and reduced-price meals, and over 250 students are experiencing housing instability. Our 'Students In Need Fund' supports students navigating poverty and homelessness. Each year, we provide funds to schools to pay for basic needs, from eye exams to after-school care. Your donations to this fund, which exceeded \$50,000 last year, make a difference to thousands

of Corvallis kids.

"We don't want to see families fall into homelessness, and after paying for rent and food there often isn't much left. We use funds from the Foundation to support families with some basic needs. Sometimes kids need a second pair of shoes because the first pair gets soaked in the rain. We distribute snacks to students during the school day, food to go home with them, and clothing. We get to know families and we know what their needs are."

Four years ago, low high school graduation rates were a call to action in Corvallis. Our donors stepped up to the challenge of funding summer programs and targeted interventions designed to get students on track to graduate. Since 2013, donors have given \$125,000 to support this work, and graduation rates are on the rise.

In summer 2016, your donations supported classes at Crescent Valley and Corvallis High Schools aimed at recovering high school credit and meeting essential skills. We also supported camps for emerging multilingual learners and AVID students (AVID is a national program aimed closing the achievement gap by preparing historically underserved students for college and success in society). Linus Pauling Middle School launched a two-week math camp, and both Wilson and Mountain View Elementary Schools offered academic programs.

The Salmon Art Project



Digital Storytelling Project

In 2015-16 your donations funded 26 teacher-designed projects totaling \$21,600 and encompassing the arts, literacy, science, technology, and mental health. Below are a few highlights.

The Marys Peak Field Trip took over 400 eighth graders to the tallest mountain in the Oregon Coast Range to learn about its flora, fauna, geology, climate, and Kalapuyan tribal history. Over 50 volunteers joined the students on the Peak, supplying expertise and encouraging the students to photograph, draw, and interpret what they experienced. This project was a collaboration with the Marys Peak Alliance and the U.S. Forest Service.

**Roots Theater/Teatro Raices** launched a bilingual theater program at Garfield Elementary, exposing all fifth graders to the performing arts. Students developed confidence, self-expression in English and Spanish, and experience onstage. Based on the novel *Esperanza Rising* by Pam Muñoz Ryan, the theater program offered an artistic connection to literature and human rights.

Breakfast Club at Corvallis High School provided an alternative morning option for students who struggle with attendance due to housing instability, mental health, or social difficulties. The primary goal of Breakfast Club was dropout prevention for high-risk students. Staff aimed to achieve this goal by improving a sense of belonging and school-connectedness, increasing positive peer relationships, teaching emotional literacy, and building coping skills.

**The Salmon Art Project** immersed sixth graders at Linus Pauling in a weeklong project that combined science, history, culture and art. Students studied the significance of salmon to healthy environments, painted salmon on canvas, and built an outdoor art installation.

The College Hill Digital Storytelling Project empowered students to tell personal stories about overcoming adversity and building community through writing, video editing, and fundraiser planning. Working in collaboration with Linn Benton Community College, students presented their digital stories at The Resilience Film Festival in the Corvallis High School auditorium on May 12th, 2016, where they received a standing ovation!
